Healing Takes Time — and a Community: Carla's Rehabilitation Journey

Carla (JC Carla's Honor) arrived at Wild Hearts in late August 2024 after sustaining a lower sesamoid fracture — an injury that requires extensive time, strict management, and hands-on care, and one that initially carried a carefully guarded prognosis.

Because Wild Hearts generally accepts horses with a clearer prognosis for a ridden second career, cases of this intensity are not part of our standard intake. But her loving connections approached us early, the timing aligned, and — thanks to the generosity and trust of our supporters — we were able to say yes.

Under the close guidance of our veterinarian, Carla entered a carefully structured rehabilitation plan including stall rest, controlled hand-walking, and scheduled imaging to monitor bone and soft-tissue healing. She has been treated with patience, consistency, and deep care from our team.

At her most recent ultrasound and X-rays, our veterinarian shared encoluraging news: "She might be the miracle of the year — her healing is surpassing expectations."





Carla will continue with controlled rest for another two months before undergoing final imaging and a full veterinary reassessment. If her healing continues on this trajectory, she will begin her foundation retraining in the spring, followed by placement into a highly specific, approved home suited to her needs.

Carla's journey reflects the very best of aftercare — a partnership of compassion, expertise, and consistency that allows a horse with a guarded prognosis the time and structure needed to heal.

This kind of outcome is only possible because of the community that stands with us. Why Aftercare?

Aftercare is more than a moment — it's a promise. It's how we honour the horses who make this sport possible and ensure they step confidently into their next chapters. At Wild Hearts, responsible transition means more than a sale.

Every horse receives:

- A complete veterinary reassessment
- Professional transitioning, from diet to daily care
- Quality retraining suited to their abilities
- Placement only into rigorously approved homes, with required follow-up so no horse ever slips through the cracks

We currently accept both sound horses and those needing rehabilitation, provided they have a prognosis for a ridden career. This approach allows us to support horses at different stages while ensuring every horse has a clear, responsible path forward.

Our adoption fees remain below market value because approved homes meet far higher standards than the open market: applications, references, facility tours, and ongoing check-ins. These safeguards create a lifelong safety net—something made possible only through structured, accountable aftercare.

Looking ahead, our long-term vision is Aftercare for All, including eventually developing a sanctuary arm so horses who are not suited to ridden work still receive lifelong dignity, safety, and peace.
